# **SECTION 9**

Public Involvement and Consultation





Stakeholder and community consultation is an integral part of the NT Environmental Impact Assessment Process, which aims to gain input into the Proposed Development both prior and after developing the PER (this Report). This sections provides a summary of the consultation process during the development of the PER and public exhibition.

The Guidelines (NRETAS, 2009) describe specific requirements for the public involvement and consultation, include:

- How public concerns were identified and how these concerns will influence the design and delivery of the proposal
- · Public involvement and the role of government organisations should be identified
- · Methods for community consultation and response should be outlined, with outcomes documented
- Document changes to the proposal resulting from community consultation
- · Details of any ongoing liaison with stakeholders and the community
- Outline negotiations and discussions with local government and relevant NT Government Agencies.

The following sections provide information on the stakeholder consultation process employed by the Proponent, noting that stakeholder and public consultation is a dynamic process that may change to better inform the public and stakeholders about the Proposed Development.

### 9.1 Community Consultation and Communication Strategy

The Proponent developed a Community Consultation and Communications Strategy (the Strategy) to inform community stakeholders who are likely to have an interest in or be affected by the proposal. The strategy was developed to meet the needs of the Guidelines for works under the Proposed Development.

### 9.1.1 Objective of the Community Consultation and Communication Strategy

The objectives of the strategy are to:

- Gain insight into the concerns each stakeholder may have in regards to the Proposed Development
- Understand the issues stakeholders feel should be addressed as part of the PER
- Inform the stakeholders of the planning process.

Specifically, it will help ensure regular and accurate information is supplied to all stakeholders, via a number of mediums; it will help increase awareness among the target audience and provide opportunities for feedback and input into the process; serve to create a high level of awareness of the project to key stakeholders; and assist the Proponent in addressing community concerns by engaging with the community and incorporating, where possible, information or actions to allay these concerns.

### 9.1.2 Consultation Process

The consultation process for the PER is based on the following approach:

- That the purpose and expectations of the consultation exercise and anticipated outcomes is clear and understood by all participants
- · Participants understand fully what they can and cannot influence
- · Consultation mechanisms will maximise stakeholder's ability to participate
- Community and stakeholder consultation activities will be as inclusive as possible, in order to ensure they are not subject to manipulation or domination by particular interests
- Information will be provided at key project milestones to adequately inform participants' inputs

- · Adequate time, staff support and funds will be made available to support the participation process
- The early identification of any concerns and issues with the project in conjunction with working closely with stakeholders, in order to develop measures to address them
- Participants will be made aware of how their inputs will be used and how they will receive feedback on the outcomes
- Thorough and transparent review of the consultation process will occur at critical points throughout the engagement and at the project's conclusion.

A broad range of tools will be used to communicate various milestones of the project with stakeholders, including a mix of newspaper advertisements; information fact sheets on the internet which can also be used as handouts; media events; and signage in the East Point area during construction will serve to create a high level of awareness of the project to stakeholders.

### 9.2 Key Stakeholders and Selected Level of Consultation

A broad range of key stakeholders throughout the community will be consulted throughout the PER process for the Proposed Development, although to varying degrees. Table 9-1 provides a list of identified stakeholders and the selected consultation process for each. Although the Proponent will endeavour to identify and consult with all stakeholders, it is recognised that some stakeholders may not be included in the register below.

Darwin residents and other stakeholders will be updated regularly through newspaper ads, press releases and the Proponents website (<u>www.powerwater.com.au</u>). Darwin residents and other stakeholders will be invited through the media to attend community briefing sessions. Stakeholders are invited to contact the Proponent if further clarification or information on the project is required, or if they wish to register as a stakeholder through the website.

### 9.3 Consultation Program

The consultation program for the PER consisted of a number of activities, providing a range of entry points for stakeholders to obtain information and provide feedback. The program was designed to keep agencies and members of the community informed of the latest project developments, providing opportunities for input where possible and consisted of three phases:

- **Phase 1**: Consultation during the preparation of the draft PER. This phase of the project consists primarily of information distribution and meetings with key stakeholders to provide input into the PER
- **Phase 2**: Consultation during the public exhibition of the draft PER. This phase of the project includes website feedback, community information sessions and submissions to the PER. Feedback from Phase 2 will be collated in the Supplementary Report for the project
- **Phase 3**: Consultation during the public exhibition of the draft PER. This phase will include signage at the work sites and updates in the media of progress of the project. The contractor will be responsible under the contract to notify the public and other persons that could be impacted from the work prior to that work commencing. A complaints reporting system included in the Construction Environmental Management Plan.

### 9.3.1 Phase 1 Consultation

This section summarises the information gained from recent consultation with a range of community stakeholder groups, including commercial, recreational and government parties. The consultation took place over the period from June 2011 and October 2011. Discussion with stakeholder groups provided an opportunity for groups to express their considerations and concerns about the Proposed Development and the potential environmental, social and economic of concern. It is important to note that the feedback contained in this section:

- · Cannot be construed as being statistically representative of opinion within the stakeholder groups
- Represents general comments made by key stakeholder groups, which were not in response to specific plans for the Proposed Development, but rather reflect their concerns and opinions
- Comments on the Ludmilla WWTP upgrade and proposed EPO extension project were not incorporated; however, the Proponent noted these comments.

Feedback collected during Phase 1 meetings is outlined in Table 9-2.
